

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### **City Country Alliance Report**

As a country group of four student leaders – two of whom had not previously travelled to Sydney and three of whom had not previously flown, the City Country Alliance Student Summit proved to be both a wonderful adventure and a personal challenge! A challenge that all participants met with a degree of trepidation but now feeling particularly chuffed to have conquered the unknown. Certainly, public transport and using an OPAL card may well be second nature to our city friends but for the Moree PS group, it became an acquired talent.

It is difficult to articulate the true value of participating in the 2017 City Country Alliance Student Summit. The four days were fast paced and every moment provided a new experience – each one leading to greater intercultural understanding and most certainly celebrating diversity in our schools. Camping – waking up to a water view; meeting new friends; watching a group of yachts manoeuvering around each other at high speeds and within metres of the shore; listening and engaging with guest speakers, especially the *Together for Humanity* team and Lorin Nicholls; interacting with the students of Belmore Boys' High and Greenacre PS; and visiting the Lakemba Mosque gave us all an opportunity to expand our beliefs and understanding of the world.

Attending Parliamentary question time and later attending the reception at Bridge Street, hosted by Mr Gareth Ward, Parliamentary Secretary to Minister for Education and Jihad Dib, Shadow Minister for Education, clearly demonstrated that friends and colleagues are able to have differing points of view but still remain friends at the end of the debate. A special word of appreciation is extended for their generosity in hosting a dinner at the Sydney Tower – both the extravagant food and beautiful view, most certainly enjoyed.

A very tired MPS team concluded their city alliance with the *School Spectacular* and happily wheeled their luggage from the Giants home ground, down-hill to Homebush Station, up the stairs and down to another platform at Lidcombe Station, into the lift at Central and onto the escalator at the airport. New friends, new experiences, an expanded understanding of the world and compassion for humanity – but excited to rejoin families upon landing at Moree.

Belmore Boys High School: In week 7 Jack, Rachel, Noah and I travelled to Sydney to participate in the City Country Alliance Student Leaders Summit. We participated in many engaging activities one of which was travelling to Belmore Boys High. While we were there we played a game of Giant Jenga and had a guided tour of their amazing gardens, complete with chickens and quiet areas. While visiting we also played table tennis in the gym but the highlight most definitely was the formal authentic cultural dinner and performances from the boys and some girls from Riverside Girls High. We had the opportunity to sample Lebanese cuisine including: tabbouleh, kebabs, hummus, falafel and kibbeh. The principal of Belmore Boys High spoke of her journey as a migrant, arriving in Australia with little English and the difficulties that her family had to overcome in seeking a better life. Principal, Hal Ramadan believes the most difficult aspect that emerged in her late teens was finding 'her home' – she returned to her country of birth only to feel that while she had family still living there, Australia was really home.

The evening entertainment also proved to be something that we had not ever had the opportunity to view – traditional belly dancing by the girls in beautiful costumes; the Harka by the Belmore Boys that was more exciting and captivating than any I have seen on television; a piano recital; and a mini documentary about the school, made by the Year 9 students.

Overall, the time we spent in Sydney was amazing - a once in a life time chance that gave us an insight into the living in a busy city; the importance of public transport and being able to read the timetables; and the opportunities that are available to us, providing we open our minds, work hard and be ready to be adventurous.
